

Above map shows Communities in Etung Ejagham cluster. The entire Etung Ejagham cluster happens to be a Local Government Area.

Etung Local Government Area is in the Central Senatorial District of Cross River State, Nigeria and was carved out from the former Ikom Local Government Area. Etung has a land mass of about 833.07 square kilometres, and shares an international boundary with the Republic of Cameroon to the East. It is bounded in the North by Ikom Local Government and in the south by Obubra and Akamkpa local Government Areas. Etung has 16 political clans and over 300 villages.

We would like emphasis that EjT understands the political relevance of Local Government Areas (LGA), Clans and Wards to the ease of governance. However, our focus is not on the modern political delineation but rather on the common heritage we share as Ejagham; a common heritage that has been in our communities long before the current political delineation.

Ejagham Nation Maps are continuously updated as we obtain new information. Experts in this discipline are welcome to assist in developing detailed Ejagham nation maps.

Q1 2021/2022 ACTIVITIES

EJAGHAM LANGUAGE CODIFICATION

The Ejagham Language Codification project is still on course. We are pleased to announce a project milestone achievement; the data collection phase of the project has been successfully completed. It was a challenging experience but also very exciting, given the data that we now have and indeed the purpose for which they are meant. The wordlist and voice-over recordings from all 7 Ejagham nation clusters are now with ELCC Secretariat.

VP Ejagham Cameroon Brief

EIT INSPIRES THE FORMATION OF EJAGHAM CREDIT UNION IN THE **CAMEROONS**

The Pan-Ejagham vision of EjT which continues to manifest through its projects such as the Ejagham Language Codification (aimed at developing a standard Ejagham Language Orthography for use in schools) has inspired the formation of a Credit Union Cooperative in the Cameroons. This is the first of its kind in the

Following the official recognition of EjT by the Eyumojock Traditional Rulers Association on September 16, 2020, the Association immediately launched EiT's Ejagham Language Codification project in the Cameroons. This project was introduced to them by Sesseku (Iyamba) Hon. Agbornduku Eret PhD who jointly serves as EjT Vice President, Ejagham Cameroon, and Member of Ejagham Language Codification Committee (ELCC). To popularise this project in the Cameroons and ensure that all Ejagham Clusters in the country provided a wordlist and voice-over recording of their Ejagham dialect, delegates from all Ejagham Clusters in the Cameroons convened in Trinity Hotel, Limbe, where they collated all required data for the project. To further demonstrate their drive for this project, the Association successfully launched the project on January 20, 2021, at Trinity Hotel, Limbe, through the facilitation of Chief Moses Obenofunde – Chairperson of the Association.

Status of Ejagham Language Codification Data Collection

DEVELOPMENT OF EJAGHAM LANGUAGE TRANSLATION TOOL

Goal of the Project: This project is an integral part of Ejagham Language Codification project deliverables. It aims to restore the Ejagham language to a place of prominence and relevance as we move into the 21st century by translating classic and modern works of literature from English to Ejagham. It is reported that one of the main reasons languages die is when 'speakers seek to learn a more-renown language to gain social and economic advantages.' Ejagham language is fast at risk of becoming an endangered language. The Linguistic Society of America

endangered language as "one that is likely to become extinct in the near future".

Our Objectives: We are confident that this project will contribute to slowing down the decline of the Ejagham language by making it socially and economically relevant. The

In the euphoria of that wonderful event, participants of the launching unanimously agreed to form this Credit Union Cooperative. The highpoint of the launching was the instantaneous floating of the Credit Union with an alarming membership of 187 holding Ordinary or Preference shares. A Board of Directors was constituted, with Dr. Orgork of SOWEDA as chairperson. The BOD has held series of meetings since the formation of the Union, and over 10 million XAF has been raised. Its membership continues to swell, as the public remains quite optimistic about the economic liberation this Union is affording all Ejagham people at home and in the Diaspora (Sixth Region).

Worthy of note is the benefit of this Union to its members. Here, shares attract dividends according to their nature, ordinary or preferential. Members can easily loan money from the Union. Above all, Risk Management works for members in the event of death. This policy is like an insurance scheme that doubles members savings and pays at death. Another interesting point to note is that membership is open to all interested Ejagham persons resident in any part of the world.

Speaking about this development, Sesseku (Iyamba) Hon. Agbornduku Eret PhD remarked: "Through this [Credit Union] we are financially independent as Ejagham people." The President and Founder of EjT, Engr. Anom Ntui Anom (a.k.a. Chris Anom) has heaped enormous praise on the Ejagham leadership in Cameroon for subscribing to the Pan-Ejagham vision of EjT. In his own words: "Our Ejagham Family in the Cameroons are setting an example that all Ejagham Clusters need to emulate...I am confident that what EjT is doing shall inspire a lot of positive groundbreaking things for Ejagham people in the 21t century and beyond."



language can become socially relevant when science, the arts and humanities can be learned and read in Ejagham. It then becomes meaningful to learn and to teach the language to Ejagham People and Local Communities and people elsewhere around the globe.

So far, a working Dataset has been acquired. The team have also identified the English translation of the Dataset that we will use to create the mapping of words/phrases from English to Ejagham to build a dictionary model. Also, language-translation machine learning model building and training is in progress.

EJAGHAM FASHION COLLECTION COMPETITION.

A cultural heritage is a collection of tangible and intangible elements that together provides the unique identity that defines and distinguishes a people. While language is central to all components, clothing art is the most flamboyant tangible element that not only serves as a mark of identity but captures very keenly a peoples' sense of aesthetics. By clothing art we are referring to a textile and related accessories; how it is woven into a cloth; how it is worn on the body (and by whom); and how it is used for other purposes. Thus, clothing art has always occupied a central place in cultural activities, and often serves as an instrument of cultural expressions. It is common knowledge, therefore, that many cultural groups are easily identified through their outfit. At this point, a burning question that surfaces is: What is Ejagham's unique clothing art? And, how can Njagham (an Ejagham person) be identified in a multicultural space through clothing art?

The question above presupposes that Ejagham clothing art is yet to be recognised as a global brand in our contemporary world. This is so

because several aspects of Ejagham heritage are at the risk of Erosion, Dilution, Adulteration, Misinterpretation, and perhaps Extinction (EDAME). EDAME is influenced mainly by Modernisation; Urbanisation; Migration, especially of young people; Technology; Lack of standardisation and one-stop-shop for Ejagham Traditional Practices (ETP) and Ejagham Cultural Expressions (ECE); General short attention span in this era, etc.


To address these challenges and further advance Ejagham, EjT has thus embarked on a systematic Documentation, Digitalisation, Dissemination of Ejagham traditional practices and cultural expression in other to preserve, safeguard and project our heritage. With specific focus on Ejagham clothing art, EjT has considered it a matter of exigency to constitute a board to collect, authenticate, and popularise pristine Ejagham clothing art, and open avenues for contemporary innovative and unique fashion concepts that can be adopted for use as updated Ejagham clothing art. 

- published or under review for publication elsewhere. File type: Manuscripts should be submitted in MS Word compatible format, e.g. DOC or RTF (not PDF), double-spaced with font size 12 in Times New Roman.

- 2. The publication of the Journal shall be annually.
