### FROM THE PRESIDENT

#### **EjT: Ejagham Beyond Borders (EBB)**

What message do I end the year 2023 with? That was the question I asked myself, and almost effortlessly, I got my answer - *Ejagham Beyond Borders*.

#### What is Ejagham?

Ejagham refers to a unique people with a shared cultural heritage occupying an expanse of territory in today's South-South Nigeria and South-West Cameroon. It is one of the many surviving pieces of evidence of the Scramble for Africa and the Berlin Conference of 1884-1885, which partitioned Africa without regard for indigenous boundaries. In the Ejagham experience, the plebiscite of 1961 cemented the separation of the Ejagham nation into the French-colonised Cameroon and British-colonised Nigeria.

Supplementing the effect of the scramble and the plebiscite, and indeed for administrative convenience, indigenous communities have been further divided into states, local governments, clans, and political wards, etc. in both Nigeria and Cameroon.

In Ejagham, this situation resulted in the discontinuities of Ejagham and the perpetuation of the silo *relationship* in the Ejagham nation with its

attendant lack of unity, progress and development in Ejagham Nation.

The forgoing calls on us to reflect on what a distinguished Ejagham son, Prof. Francis Bisong, stated in his presentation at the first - and so far the only - EjT-instigated 2019 Ejagham Academia League conference in Calabar, Cross River State. The event, which took place in Pyramid Hotel, Calabar, was a maiden assembly of Ejagham Academia in Nigeria. An extract from Prof. Francis Bissong's presentation reads:

"These discontinuities in political arrangements and configurations have resulted in the seeming loss of steam and cohesiveness in defining a typical Ejagham identity and forging a common future for relevance in contemporary life".

EjT is focused on changing the narrative highlighted by Prof. Bisong and encouraging a more *integrated relationship* of *Ejagham Beyond Borders*. This will bring about the needed cohesiveness, common identity, and unity and crank the engines for forging a common future for the progress, development and relevance of Ejagham nation.

You may ask what exactly EjT is doing to change the narrative and what an EBB would look like.

To the first part of the question, EjT is aware that several complementary actions could be taken to bring about EBB. We also recognise that these actions would succeed only if they rest on a solid foundation. Depending on the lens through which it is viewed, the description of what constitutes a solid foundation may differ.

At EjT, we have made the conscious decision that one of the things that constitutes a solid foundation in the drive for EBB is the development and use of a standard Ejagham language across the Ejagham nation. Hence, EjT is championing the development of a Harmonized Ejagham Language Orthography (HELO). HELO will lead to institutionalising the teaching of Ejagham language in learning institutions across Ejagham nation. The knock-on effect of this singular action

would be the much needed unity, progress and development in Ejagham Nation.

To the second part of the question, I wished I knew exhaustively what an EBB would look like, but I do not. What I know is that other multi-cluster heritage, such as the Yorubas, Hausas and Igbos had long developed harmonised orthographies for their languages and that furthered the integration of their nations. So, if one evaluates the overall situation of these nations, are they united, progressive and making developmental strides in various fields of human endeavours? So, to the question 'what would an EBB look like'? your guess is as good as mine.





## Ekup na nkad – Thank you - for your Support in 2023

In the context of what EjT has achieved, 2023 has been a mixed bag experience. Nevertheless, EjT's principle in the measure of achievement remains the same.

"What is the potential of our members, and indeed Ejagham people, that could be applied to achieve our Mission, Vision and Objectives? We see a lot. Given that potential, what have we achieved so far? Potential versus Achievements is the real measure. Given our potential, our achievements to date leaves much to be desired".

Above statement was true in 2020 and remains true today. However, although we have many squares ahead of us in the pursuit of our Mission, Vision and Objectives, we are surely no longer in square one. We have made some progress, curtesy of our volunteers, members, and the EjT Leadership Team. Ekup na nkad – Thank you.

Below are some of the positive achievements for 2023.

### **Ejagham Language Codification (ELC)**

Our flagship project, Ejagham Language Codification (ELC), completed the Intelligibility Test phase in 2023. The intelligibility test culminated in the receipt verbal acceptance from all Ejagham Traditional Councils and Associations as well as formal letters of acceptance from all Ejagham clusters — as we still await Etung. The Technical Team of ELCC is currently finalising arrangements for the presentation of the proposed HELO to NERDC in Nigeria and similar regulatory authorities in Cameroon.

Ekup na nkad to the Technical Team and ELCC for leading us this far.

## Learning/Teaching Moments on EjT Members Platform

Is this a project? Well, no, it is not a project. However, the EjT Members' only WhatsApp platform stands out as a Learning/Teaching portal and is therefore worth recognising. Even more worthy of recognition are those who have spared no effort in taking advantage of the platform to share their knowledge of Ejagham heritage.

It is important to note that as much as we pride ourselves as a people with a rich heritage, if we do not share the knowledge of our heritage, the alternative is that we would transition with such knowledge into the great oblivion. This is a recipe for extinction of our heritage. For those who are sharing such knowledge, EjT is eternally grateful. Ekup na nkad to those who have supported EjT's course in this respect.

### **Ejagham Students**

Ejagham Students Association is not new. In fact, our own Prof. Ekanem Wokoma stated:

"During my secondary school days in the late 1960s and early 1970s, it was a strong association that brought together secondary school students of Ejagham nation together from all over the then South-Eastern State together. ... Most of the students were from Oban and Ikom".

Today, Ejagham Clans and Clusters Associations exist, instead of Ejagham Students Associations. This is a clear demonstration of Silo Relationship across Ejagham nation orchestrated by political delineation. EjT created an EjT Students Forum, a platform intended to bring back the spirit of the erstwhile Ejagham Students Association Prof. Ekanem Wokoma reminisced. EjT is glad to mention that through this platform, Ejagham students are discovering themselves as a people of Ejagham identity. For the first time since the 1970s, students from Bakor, Akamkpa and Etung clusters are members of one Ejagham Students

Association, the EjT Students Forum.

There is still work to be done to have a full house (all Ejagham clusters) on board. In the meantime, Ekup na nkad to the clans and cluster student leaders who have helped to make the EjT Students Forum a reality. These include Nta Charles Ntui of the Akamkpa Students Association, Mr. Abe Clement of the Ekajuk Students Association, Mr. Ntui Sam and Mr. Patrick Alibi of the Etung Students Association, Mr. Nathaniel Molang of the Ogoja Students Association, Mr. Mgbe Mathaias Igu of Nkum Students Association, to mention a few.

### The EjT Website

In pursuit of our Triple-D strategy, the EjT website is our main means of disseminating Ejagham Traditional Practices and Cultural Expressions to the global audience. The EjT website is like a house, which is good to have. However, it is the content of a house that turns it into a home, a home worth living and visiting. Ekup na nkad to all those who have supported EjT in one way or another to provide contents that can be found on EjT website. Clearly, there is a lot of work to be done to turn this house into a comfortable home and we are counting on you in the coming years ahead.




